

The French author and memoirist Violette Leduc was a controversial pioneer. Her taboo-breaking memoir, *La Bâtard, (The Bastard)*, became an enormous literary success. Through her work, she confronted the experience of being an illegitimate child, homosexuality, abortion, and explored with intensity and total candor the reaches of female desire – all scandalous, indecent subjects for macho 1950s France. A contemporary of Sartre, Cocteau and Genet and published by Albert Camus, she was encouraged to write by Simone de Beauvoir. After decades of toiling in obscurity, Leduc would go on to publish the lesbian classic *Thérèse and Isabelle*.
